### THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK:

# <u>Ephesians 4 verse 32 –</u> Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. REFLECTION:

The Lord's Prayer, contained in Matthew's gospel chap. 6, also referred to as the Family Prayer, is an example of the requests we could include in a prayer, starting and concluding with an adulation – "Our Father in heaven, hallowed (or holy) be your name", and ending with "For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and for ever".

In between we have a plea for God's kingdom to be established, his will to be done, and for each one to be given what they need to eat, and relevant to today's "Thought" we find the words "Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us".

There is then a plea to save us from the time of trial (testing), and deliverance from evil (oppression, persecution or other suffering).

This is a prototype of prayer, and in context of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus places this between rules on giving and further instruction on fasting.

For our reflection he concludes with (verses 14,15), "For if you forgive those who sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you: but if you do not forgive others their sins, your Father will not forgive yours.

St. Paul in the text above from his epistle to the church of Ephesus , also adds the words "be kind and compassionate to one another".

We all at times harbour a grudge or feel resentment against someone else. It is only human nature to be quick to take offence, especially if we are a sensitive type of person; and sometimes a word spoken thoughtlessly or in haste from a sense of anxiety or pure misunderstanding is taken the wrong way. Being sensitive works both ways though, and we also need to be sensitive to what we say, because the WAY we say something can be misconstrued.

But there are also sins or offences of omission, as well as 'commission'. That is when one fails to do something that is reasonably expected, like remembering a birthday, or forgetting about a promise made.

The difficult part in all this is to say sorry, and to be reconciled to the other person. That is brought about by seeing their point of view and putting yourself in their shoes: treating the other person as you would like to be treated. If you can say sorry, and the offended other can accept that and not only forget the situation, but also overlook it - in the spirit of love, even as we find ourselves forgiven by God - then we are preserving the bond of Christian fellowship and are able to live at peace with everyone (Romans 12:17,18.)
