Three years that changed the world

In March we had a wonderful evening at Bromsgrove Methodist Church when we were marvellously entertained by the band 'After Hours'. I gave a little talk at the end which a few folk were gracious enough to say they appreciated. Here it is again in a slightly edited form.

On 3rd February 1959, Buddy Holly tragically died alongside two others, Ricky Vallance and the 'Big Bopper' JP Richardson, when their plane crashed. Buddy was twenty-two years old. Don McClean famously sang of that event, in his song 'American Pie', that it was the day the music died. Here's the pertinent verse:

> 'But February made me shiver With every paper I'd deliver Bad news on the doorstep I couldn't take one more step I can't remember if I cried When I read about his widowed bride Something touched me deep inside **The day the music died.'**

I can't remember it because I wasn't born yet! More senior readers, especially members of Christian congregations, might have been told by their elders that they shouldn't be listening to such music as it would lead them away from godly ways into all sorts of devilish behaviour. I will have to leave it with you to judge whether this turned out to be the case?!

But as we can testify from the music and songs performed for us by 'After Hours' at our recent concert the music definitely didn't die with Buddy Holly! Great tunes and songs continued to emerge through the 1960's, 70's, 80's and beyond. And it's funny how it's often the older tunes that we warm to and somehow still bring back memories and lift the spirits.

Coming back to Buddy Holly, he was only publicly widely known for a little under three years. The earliest known recording of him singing was as a twelve-year-old, years before he became famous. After a few false starts his first significant record to be a success was 'That'll be the day', released in 1957. Following this his fame spread, and he proved prolific as a songwriter and performer. He even toured England in March 1958.

However, by early 1959 he was tragically dead. After this he might have simply faded away, not having been with us long enough to have a significant influence or leave a legacy. Instead, the opposite happened. Many unissued recordings of Buddy's songs were pressed and released after his death. And many people in the musical know say he changed music in profound ways with many later artists, including The Beatles, seeing Buddy Holly as a key inspiration.



Which brings me to someone else who was only publicly active for around three years and died a seemingly tragic death at the age of around thirty-three. His short life and death has continued to influence, shape and inspire countless people down the centuries. I trust quite a few of our readers still look to him for inspiration. He is of course Jesus of Nazareth.

A difference between Jesus and Buddy Holly is that as far as we know Jesus didn't write any songs. On the other hand, there are far more songs about Jesus than Buddy Holly! We keep on looking to Jesus for inspiration, and still seek to make sense of, and even take inspiration from, his short years of public ministry and the manner of his death. And then there is that extra important part about him rising from the dead, and somehow being present with, and even in, his followers.

I don't think I'm saying anything controversial when I say that as enduring as the music of Buddy Holly has continued to be, Jesus has had a far bigger influence! The piece of prose overleaf, purportedly by James Francis, summarises it eloquently. The concert was a fundraiser for the church in these challenging times. The money raised will go towards ensuring Bromsgrove Methodist Church remains alive and kicking as a Jesus centred place of song and inspiration. If you haven't joined us for a while, you are always more than welcome to do so. The Easter Season is a particularly good time to seek to reconnect as we revisit the profoundly world shaking and world shaping events leading up to, through and beyond the death and resurrection of Jesus. Maybe, just maybe, you will discover how this Jesus might yet shape your life and be an inspiration to it. And you might even find yourself singing one of his songs!

He was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in another village. He worked in a carpenter shop until he was thirty, and then for three years he was an itinerant preacher. He never wrote a book. He never held an office. He never owned a home. He never had a family. He never went to college. He never travelled more than two hundred miles from the place where he was born. He never did any of the things that usually accompany greatness. He had no credentials but himself.

While he was still a young man, the tide of public opinion turned against him. His friends ran away. He was turned over to his enemies and went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his executioners gambled for the only piece of property he had on earth, and that was his coat. When he was dead, he was laid in a borrowed grave through the kindness of a friend.

Nearly twenty centuries have come and gone, and today he is still the central figure of the human race and the leader of mankind's progress. I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that have ever marched, all the navies that have ever sailed, all the parliaments that have ever sat, and all the kings that have ever reigned, all put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as much as that **One Solitary Life**.

Below is the story of the Basilica

The Basílica i Temple Expiatori de la Sagrada Família, shortened as the Sagrada Família, is an unfinished church in the Eixample district of Barcelona, Catalonia, Spain. Designed by the Catalan architect Antoni Gaudí (1852–1926), his work on Sagrada Família is part of a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

On 7 November 2010, Pope Benedict XVI consecrated the church and proclaimed it a minor basilica.

On 19 March 1882, construction of the Sagrada Família began under architect Francisco de Paula del Villar. In 1883, when Villar resigned, Gaudí took over as chief architect, transforming the project with his architectural and engineering style, combining Gothic and curvilinear Art Nouveau forms.

Gaudí devoted the remainder of his life to the project, and he is buried in the church's crypt. At the time of his death in 1926, less than a quarter of the project was complete.

Construction on Sagrada Família is not supported by any government or official church sources. Private patrons funded the initial stages. Money from tickets purchased by tourists is now used to pay for the work together with private donations.

In October 2018, Sagrada Família trustees agreed to pay city authorities €36million for a building permit, after 136 years of unlicensed construction. Most of the funds would be directed to improve the access between the church and the Barcelona Metro. The permit was issued by the city on 7 June 2019. The aim is to complete the construction in 2026 to commemorate the Centenary of Gaudi's death. *(From Wikipedia)*

THE BIDDENDEN DOLE An Easter tradition

Should you just happen to be exploring the Weald of Kent, you may come across the picturesque village of Biddenden: the distinctive village sign depicts the legendary 12th century Biddenden Maids.

Reputedly, Eliza (or Elisa) and Mary Chulkhurst were Siamese twins, joined at the hip and shoulder, and they survived for 34 years until one was seized with an incurable illness and died. Despite the entreaties of friends, the other refused to be separated from her sister, saying that they had come into the world together and so they must leave together. Six hours later they did.

In their wills the twins left about 20 acres (8 hectares) of land – known locally as 'The Bread and Cheese Land'; the rent from the land was to provide a Dole. Originally this was a gift of bread and cheese, handed out annually to the village poor.

Each Easter Monday local widows and pensioners still receive this Dole, together with tea, butter and a special biscuit bearing an image of the twins and their names.

Originally the Dole was issued inside the parish church; later, in the church porch – and more recently from a window of the old Workhouse.

When I survey the wondrous cross by Isaac Watts (1674-1748)

When I survey the wondrous cross on which the Prince of Glory died, my richest gain I count but loss, and pour contempt on all my pride.

Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast save in the death of Christ my God, All the vain things that charm me most, I sacrifice them to his blood.

See from his head, his hands, his feet, sorrow and love flow mingled down; did e'er such love and sorrow meet, or thorns compose so rich a crown?

Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were an offering far too small; love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE (Courtesy of Britannica). Isaac Watts was a dissenting (free church) minister in what later became the Congregational Church and was a prolific hymn writer, with credit for some 750 hymns. This hymn "When I survey" is one of his most well-known. He was born in Southampton, and died in Stoke Newington.

COMMENT The cross of Christ, which is the central pillar of Christian symbolism, is the foundation of our gospel of redemption and salvation, through the atoning death of Jesus, the just for the unjust, the sinless for sinners, through whose name forgiveness is offered, and spiritual newness, both in this mortal life, and, we believe, into eternity when we die. John 3:16 tells us in Jesus' words to Nicodemus that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not die, but have everlasting life."

Watts in the above words is humbled in his realisation of just how great a gift the cross of Christ is to believers. He calls Jesus the "Prince of glory", referring to Jesus coming from heaven (glory) and his returning to it at his Ascension, following his Resurrection. "Glory" also can refer to the praise and adoration due to Jesus because of the life he lived, in which he set us a perfect example. The author goes on to say that any gain is worthy to be surrendered up to God (my richest gain I count but loss) and it cancels any false sense of pride in his possessions or achievements, in comparison to the truth of the cross. He continues to say that there is no room for boasting on his part except in the death of Christ, echoing the words of Paul. The sacrifice of Jesus leads him to wonder what he can sacrifice in turn (all the vain things that charm him most - or mean the most to him).

In the third stanza we read how Jesus suffered (his head, his hands, his feet, in sorrow and love) for the state of humanity; and Watts asks the question "Did e'er such love and sorrow meet, or thorns compose so rich a crown?"

Then he concludes his hymn with the declaration that even if he could offer God the whole realm of nature, (flora, fauna, animals, birds, fish, the whole of creation!), even that would not be enough to please God in Christ! No, he says nothing less than "my soul, my life, my all" will do. God is responsible in his love for <u>all</u> that we have, <u>all</u> that we are, having made us and redeemed us at great price, so that we belong to him <u>twice</u> over. Understandably, words fail us when we try to describe God's love.

John 20: 1-10

But Jesus loved me very much, too, with my vulnerability and sensitive nature, and he forgave me, keeping me close by his side.

The current Pastoral Visitors will continue their role but, to ensure that no one is overlooked, it would be helpful if anyone in the congregation who is aware of any Member or Adherent who needs the Church's support let us know.

18 months ago, we sent a donation to UNHCR, to help support refugees in Afghanistan. Their recent newsletter reported on work there in the last 18 months, so it seemed very appropriate to share it.

Here are some statistics:

- 21 schools built by UNHCR, benefitting 46,815 children. The Principal of a girls' school in Kandahar reported: "This new school building has huge classrooms along with desks and chairs by which students can study better . . it has a positive impact on students' lives and ability to learn"
- 212,359 people received emergency relief items such as blankets and solar lamps.
- 3,750 people received entrepreneurship and business support assistance. Ferhana, widowed mother of 5 in Kabul, said: *"I heard about this initiative just when I needed it. I am so grateful that now I don't have to rely on anyone else to support my family"*
- 975,700 people supported with emergency payments, including Abu, In Badakshan, who said:
 "With this support I was able to open my tailoring shop and receive a regular income. This has also helped me enrol my children in school, which was not a possibility before."

Thanks to the generosity of all who give, we've been able to continue to donate to worthy causes, both globally – e.g. Pakistan, Turkey, Syria, and locally – e.g. the Basement Project, Dodford Children's Holiday Farm.
