From John Rhead: Samaritan's Purse, a Christian 'International Relief' organisation, seeks to enter a disaster area as quickly as possible. Two days after the Turkish 7.7 magnitude earthquake of 6th February, it had a field hospital erected and running on the car park of Antakya Hospital (formerly Antioch where the

term 'Christian' was coined, Acts 11, 26) and eighty five staff on the ground. The hospital has fifty two inpatient beds, four intensive care beds, emergency rooms, and two operating theatres. The need there was real and urgent. Over48,000 are known to have died, one and a quarter million displaced. The hospital (as at 25 March) had helped 284 in-patients, 6,435 out-patients, and undertaken 244 surgeries. It will remain there permanently and is intended to be given to the Turkish government. Over 3,500 emergency shelters have also been sent out for those living outdoors.

Drugs and surgical supplies are in the hospital pharmacy, much in glass bottles on shelving. In the second earthquake (20 February, magnitude 6.3) the shelves collapsed tipping everything onto the floor. Yet not one bottle was broken – they see that as a miracle!

The organisation undertook to send out sixteen thousand 'hygiene boxes' to those displaced. These are being prepared at the Oldbury warehouse (almost entirely by volunteers) and contain the hygiene needs for one family for a month. Soaps, shampoo, conditioner, toothpaste and toothbrushes, combs, razors, facecloth, feminine hygiene materials etc. Approaching 12,000 (two lorry loads) have gone, a third load is being prepared.

I have spent time at the warehouse making boxes from flat pack. Surely God's work helping those who have lost so much.

THANK YOU: I would like to say a very big thank you to the Church Family for all the thoughts and prayers, Phone calls and offs of help and support during my period of Covid and Chest Infection, and Cyber and Identity theft attacks when I was at my lowest ebb ever. You really are a caring church family and I can assure you, it is very much appreciated. I think I am slowly on the mend but I intend to take a Covid test over this weekend, as my daughter has now tested negative and I was a couple of days after her. THOUGHT FOR EASTER SUNDAY - StF 3 0 3 (part) by Samuel Medley (1738-99)

I know that my Redeemer lives – what joy the blest assurance gives... He lives, to bless me with his love; he lives, to plead for me above; He lives, my hungry soul to feed; he lives to help in time of need. He lives, and grants me daily breath; he lives, and I shall conquer death; He lives, all glory to his name; he lives my Saviour, still the same; What joy the blest assurance gives, I know that my Redeemer lives.

REFLECTION:

Easter Sunday is the culmination of Lent and Holy Week, and today we celebrate with joy and thanks the doctrine of our Saviour's Resurrection. After all the roller-coaster events of the past week of the Christian calendar, the triumphal ride into Jerusalem of Jesus ("Ride on, ride on in majesty"), the agony in Gethsemane which followed the Last supper, then the betrayal and arrest of Jesus, his humiliation, mockery and rejection not only by the Jewish authorities, but also the abandonment by his disciples, including Peter's denial.

We have remembered the agony of his death on the cross and his cry of "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" We hear his dying words "It is finished", but not before he has promised the repentant thief "This night you will be with me in paradise!" Then there is the compassion for his mother Mary when he says to her indicating John "Your son" and to John "Your mother" and we are told John took Mary into his home to look after her.

Then there is the centurion who says at the cross "Surely this was the Son of God!".

As the hymn 277 says "Here might I say and sing, no story so divine: never was love, dear King, never was grief like thine!"

Yet, as Jesus promised, he rose on the third day, our Easter Sunday, and by faith, we happily say with Medley above "I know that my Redeemer lives, what joy the blest assurance gives."

Because Jesus lives we can be assured that we can live transformed, fulfilled lives in the here and now, and be assured of living in God's presence when our earthly journey is done. Jesus lives "to bless me with his love", and moreover "to plead for me above."

Jesus lives with us and within us by his Spirit, and as the hymn says, he "feeds my hungry soul, helps me in time of need" (echoes of another hymn "What a friend we have in Jesus"). He "grants me daily breath", and because he lives I hope to live for ever through his name - "he lives and I shall conquer death". As the words conclude above, we have a Saviour, always "the same". So we have joy in our hearts on Easter day, and every day, because as we sing "I know that my Redeemer lives". Happy Easter! John.
