Living with change and uncertainty

Dear Friends

I want to begin by offering my heartfelt thanks for the many expressions of understanding, love and support I've received since the announcement, first made public on April 16th, that it is likely that I will be going part time from this coming September. The reasons for needing to take this step were included in the initial announcement and expanded upon in the fuller brief which can be found on the Circuit website.

I'd like to be able to say that I feel mightily relieved now that the news is out there and that there is light at the end of the tunnel in terms of life becoming a bit more manageable. However, this is not quite yet the case, I think because of what can be summed up in one word: uncertainty. Currently the intended changes in my ministry pattern throw up quite a few questions to which we don't yet have answers such as:

will I be able to limit myself to working part time, including learning on occasions to say no?! Will I be able to cope with the change? Will we be able to find a minister to provide pastoral oversight to Bromsgrove Methodist and other churches? If not, what do we do then? Etcetera.

I'm aware that the change and uncertainty introduced by what is happening with me only adds to other challenges facing us as churches, which can lead to such questions as 'Who will fill that role?', 'How will we afford it?', 'How can we reach people? and even 'How much longer will we be here after our 40th anniversary?' This is before we add our various personal, family, national and global concerns.

Living with such unanswered questions and uncertainty is not easy for many of us and has potential to create a nervousness within us, worry and disturbed sleep. Perhaps to a degree this is only natural. However, I'm encouraged that we have resources to draw upon, some decidedly of a faith and spiritual foundation, which may help us to bear up and even prosper in the face of change and uncertainty. Jesus' teaching to his disciples to not worry (Matthew 6:25 onwards) encourages us to trust that God loves and values us, knows our needs, and will provide.

Hymns such as 'In heavenly love abiding' and 'This, this is the God we adore' express a deep security and trust in God. Sometimes it is an effort to identify with and stick with such scripture and hymnody in the face of actual lived uncertainties and changes, yet I often find that is I will only dwell with them for long enough a sense of renewed calm and trust grows with in me. I trust and pray you will likewise find this to be the case.

May the peace of God, which passes all understanding, guard our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.

BMC AGM Item 10: Connexional, District and Circuit Report

To guite a few people in our churches when it comes to anything outside of local church life is perhaps a matter of out of sight and out of mind?! It is true that most of the life of the Methodist Church takes place in and through local congregations. Nevertheless, for good or ill (and arguably it is a mixture of both?!) Bromsgrove Methodist Church is part of a wider whole, being part of a local group of churches (Bromsgrove & Redditch Circuit), region (Birmingham District) and national body (Methodist Connexion). What follows is a summary of some of the headlines emerging from Circuit, District and Connexion in the last year or so.

Bromsgrove & Redditch Circuit

The Circuit covers the ten churches, six manses and some 'five spaces' for which it has ultimate responsibility: Peck Wood, Blackwell Hall, Matchborough, Online and Bluntington graveyard!

The most obvious way in which Circuit impacts the local church is through the provision of preachers each Sunday via the Circuit preaching plan. Other gatherings of a Circuit nature are Methodist Women in Britain (MWiB) and 3Gen – a gathering for youth.

The key Circuit level meetings and gatherings that take place throughout the year are the Circuit meeting, Circuit Leadership Team (CLT), Staff meeting, Local Preacher and Worship leaders meeting, along with the occasional meetings which are the Circuit Invitations Committee, annual gathering of church treasurers and church safeguarding officers gathering.

- In addition the current appointments for both Rev Stephen Levett and Rev Latika Singh come to an end in August 2024. The Re-invitation and stationing process in regard to the persons and stations concerned will take place in the late spring and summer of 2023.
- The Circuit treasurer role is formally vacant, with John Wyatt seeking to retire from the role as \Rightarrow soon as practicable. A new reduced role description is being created in the hope that it will prove attractive to someone. Much of the financial day to day activities of the Circuit going forward will be carried out by the Circuit Administrator Lucy West, who will be adding the role of Circuit Assistant Treasurer to her work.
- Likewise the CLT is seeking to create a role description for a Circuit Property Steward, the role \Rightarrow having effectively been unfilled, and covered on a limited basis by the Circuit Treasurer, since the death of John Hobbs a decade ago.

Finance

The CLT and Circuit treasurer are aware that most, if not all, churches in the circuit are running \Rightarrow deficit budgets having been impacted by both Covid and the cost of living crisis. In response to this reality as a means of supporting the churches it has been Circuit Meeting policy to freeze and indeed reduce individual church assessments to the Circuit budget in the last few years. This has led to the Circuit itself running at a not insignificant budget deficit. Consideration needs to be given as to whether this policy and practice can and should continue and the short, medium and longer terms as like the individual churches the Circuit does not hold inexhaustible resources.

Mission

- A specific outcome of the Circuit Vision Day held in March of 2022 was a recognition across \Rightarrow the churches of a need to grow in commitment to, confidence in, and action towards evangelism, whereby we witness to and offer Jesus Christ to people in the hope that they will receive Him as Good News and take steps to become his disciples. To this end the Circuit facilitated the Everyone an Evangelist process, incorporating Talking Jesus, across the Circuit in the three -month period up to Christmas 2022. Engagement in the opportunity was varied with some not appearing to engage at all. However those who did take part reported at least some growth in confidence and intentionality in witness and faith sharing conversations.
- New Place for New People (NPNP) at Peckwood. The intention to explore pioneering of a NPNP \Rightarrow goes back to at least the autumn of 2019, itself in response to the invitation and challenge of first the Birmingham Church without walls initiative and then the national God for all evange*lism and church growth* strategy. Following a sustained period of reflection in March this year we finally partially released and commissioned Rev Ruth Wilson to head up attempts to plant a Forrest Church based at and out of Peckwood.

Structures fit for purpose

A second Circuit Vision day was held in January 2023. The focus was to launch serious and re- \Rightarrow alistic consideration of the challenges facing individual churches in terms of lack of personnel and energy. As things stand individual churches are responsible for ensuring they have the people they need to exist as a church and to form a church council (a minimum number of members), as well as have people to fulfil key positions of responsibility. The vision day sought to suggest there may be other options to explore, in terms such as sharing officers and/or merging church councils, which might still allow our current ten churches in their ten buildings to both survive and thrive. The written summary of the day should have by now been

circulated to all members of church councils. A limited number of printed copies will soon be made available to the wider church membership. At some point in the early summer, it is hoped that individual churches will find the space and time to have conversations about the day and summary, before Circuit level conversations commence on if and how to take the conversation further.

Birmingham District

The main means of the Birmingham District gathering is via two day long Representative Synod's held each year in the Autumn and Spring. To some degree District acts as a conduit between the Conference and the Circuits.

We were delighted to welcome our new Chair of District Rev Novette Headley at the beginning of September 2023.

Conversations are due to take place as to if and how we can work more closely with the neighbouring Wolverhampton & Shrewsbury District, possibly with a view to merging into one District around September 2025.

Methodist Connexion (National)

The key gathering of the national Methodist Church is the annual Methodist Conference generally held in June each year. The Connexional website can be found at: www.methodist.org.uk

Sometimes it can feel as if the Connexion is remote from and not particularly understanding of the pressures being experienced on the more local ground level which is Circuit and the Local Methodist Church. Nevertheless, if it were not for the Conference and Connexion local churches would have to devise and do a lot more themselves, from first principles, in regards to many compliance matters such as safeguarding, GDPR, charity commission and financial compliance etc. In addition, churches would need to find, train and negotiate terms with their own Ministers!? More profoundly it is often to Conference that ideas and concerns are brought from the local, Circuit and District levels which ultimately lead to good theological and practical work at Connexional level that is then presented to Conference for consideration before being presented to the Districts, Circuits and local churches for reflection, consideration and action. In recent years some of the more significant reports and pieces of work emerging from Conference have included:

- 1. God in Love Unites us.
- 2. God for all: Evangelism and Growth Strategy.
- 3. Equality and Diversity - including mandatory training on unconscious bias.
- 4. Theology of Safeguarding report
- 5. Methodist Way of Life - effectively a discipleship resource and process
- 6. be net zero by 2030.
- 7. Walking with Micah - a justice focussed programme.
- 8.

Hope in God's Future – Eco/environment - including an aim for us as Methodist Churches to

Trusteeship and oversight, in part at the strong encouragement of the Charity Commission

There is probably a number 9 & 10 I could add but that is enough to be going on with!

As Circuit we are considering how we might facilitate consideration and as necessary application of some of these reports but there is nothing to prevent individual churches taking the initiative themselves.

LAWNS

God's thoughts on lawns.....written to St Francis

GOD: Frank, you know all about gardens and nature. What in the world is going on down there on the planet? What happened to the dandelions, violets, thistle and stuff I started aeons ago? I had a perfect, no-maintenance garden plan. Those plants grow in any type of soil, withstand drought and multiply with abandon. The nectar from the long lasting blossoms attracts butterflies, honey bees and flocks of songbirds. I expected to see a vast garden of colours by now. But all I see are these green rectangles.

ST. FRANCIS: It's the tribes that settled there, Lord. The Suburbanites. They started calling your flowers 'weeds' and went to great lengths to kill them and replace them with grass.

GOD: Grass? But it's so boring. It's not colourful. It doesn't attract butterflies, birds and bees, only grubs and sod worms. It's sensitive to temperatures. Do these Suburbanites really want all that grass growing there?

ST. FRANCIS: Yes, Sir.

Tetanya's Easter Flowers

A Bromsgrove refugee has been forced to celebrate Easter away from home and family as the war continues in Ukraine.

Tetyana Galenda lived in Ukraine's second city Kharkiv - about 50 km from the eastern border with Russia. But she fled the bloodshed and is now staying with a host in Bromsgrove.

So this Easter, the 64-year-old grandmother used her skills to produce a floral centrepiece for celebrations at Bromsgrove Methodist Church Centre, rather than selling bouquets from the Kharkiv flower shop she has run for 19 years.

Using a translation app, Tetyana explained that this year, her Easter is very different.

"Before the war, every year I baked Easter cakes and made cottage cheese. This is our tradition. We painted eggs and the whole family gathered for this great holiday. At my shop we also made a lot of bouquets for this holiday."

But the shop is now closed, and Tetyana is constantly in fear for her aunt, sister and disabled brother who've remained in the place she still calls home. "I am very worried for them," she added. "Every day I call them in the morning to find out if they are ok and how many times Kharkiv has been bombed and if my house has been hit with a rocket or shrapnel while they are in the place. I don't know how much more the house will stand from the rockets."

Tetyana is grateful for the local support she's received from Bromsgrove & Redditch Welcome Refugees (BRWR), which also provides weekly social gettogethers and English teaching for Ukrainian refugees. "I am very thankful. I really like to learn English and all the teachers are lovely. I enjoy going to the classes," she said.

Tetyana now hopes to meet more of the estimated 100 Ukrainian refugees living in and around the Bromsgrove.

The free support group meetings are held every Thursday morning between 10 am and 12 noon at the Bromsgrove Methodist Church Centre on Stratford Road. Refugees and supporters are welcome to just turn up - there's no need to book. Further information from <u>sandiejefford@gmail.com</u> or <u>info@brwr.uk</u>

REFLECTION

We are in the period of Pentecost, which celebrates the gift of the Holy Spirit to first century believers, and which was the power that enabled the birth of the Christian church. (see Acts chapters 2 and 3). That gift, we thank God, has never been withdrawn, and it is through the Spirit working in and through believers that God's kingdom is served today as it has been down the ages, changing lives and changing situations. The Spirit is the spirit of Christ working in us and through us. We need to talk of what Christ has done in our lives (Lose your shyness, find your tongue, tell the world what God has done.)

The theme includes the idea that a better tomorrow for all is our hope, and the last line of three of the verses is "live tomorrow's life today". Also repeated is the sentence "Praise the love that Christ revealed, living, working in our world!" We need to remember amidst all of the human suffering, that God's love is shown in so many ways, such as the beauty and wonder of nature, kind, self-giving actions of many people, medical discoveries, the gift of a child or grandchild, and so on The latter half reminds the reader/singer that we need to do what we can to make a difference - (Feeding the hungry, seeing wrong and setting right), to offer welcome to strangers, house the homeless, all walking in the light of the Spirit.

Wren repeats the plea that the Spirit will "fill our praise, guide our thoughts and change our ways."

He concludes with "There's a Spirit in the air, calling people everywhere. In life Christ calls us, in many ways including the words "Come to me all you who are burdened and I will give you rest." Every blessing, JOHN
