THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK:

Last week I wrote about being able to go on holiday and how beneficial this can be, for those fortunate to enough, circumstances permitting, to get away. I also urged prayer for the leisure, tourism and holiday trade. This week I am exercised about the long summer school holidays and what they entail for the children, teaching staff and parents, grandparents and carers.

I seem to remember long, bright sunny days through August, when I was a schoolboy, growing up on the south coast (Christchurch, in Hampshire, now Dorset). On a clear day, it seemed that one could row a boat, or even swim, to the white shining Needles on the Isle of Wight, some 11 or 12 miles away. My friends and I naturally spent a lot of time on the beach, getting sunburned quite regularly, there being less concern about exposure in those days.

As with today, the problem was what to do with one's time, and I confess, I occasionally got up to mischief – what kids didn't !

In those days, I used to save Corona bottles and return them for the deposit of a few pence; i also worked for a local grocer, delivering groceries (think of the David Jason character from Open All Hours, with a bike and basket and metal stand. Once it fell over spilling the goods on the road, when I was delivering ! I also had a morning paper round, before school, to raise extra cash. It didn't do me any harm, taught me self-discipline and that "money doesn't grow on trees". You may imagine money was hard-won in my family, but we never went without.

This all brings me to the difficulties facing parents, and grandparents today, when they have to find so much extra finance, to amuse and entertain their children or grandchildren for the six week break. Many parents have their 2 weeks or more annual break from work, so they can be together, as a family, building memories for the future. But that still leaves the other four weeks. So although we worry about excessive "screentime" for the younger people, that is a cheaper option, than, say, Alton Towers. A good and relatively inexpensive option is a family annual membership of English Heritage or the National Trust, because it is quite easy to recoup the expenditure over a few visits.

So when we older folk are inclined to complain about too many people around, too few parking spaces, too much road traffic, too much queuing, let us remember we were young once, and remember with thanks the sterling work done by the teachers who have a well-earned rest, and also the parents and grandparents, who are spending quality time strengthening bonds with the younger generation, even if they become a little broke, and frazzled in the process. And "Hurrah" for holiday clubs, who give the mums and dads a break, especially those run by churches, enabling fresh contacts to be made, in a friendly, safe and welcoming environment.
