The next café is 21<sup>st</sup> June 2-4pm. *Pat Booth.* **THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK:**  <u>"By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so on the</u> seventh day he rested from all his work....The seventh day is holy, on it you shall do no work."(Genesis 2.2 & Exodus 20 v. 10 – part).

#### **REFLECTION:**

Today while waiting for Jean who was in a shop, I struck up a conversation with a man by commenting on the un-summery weather – as you do. He went on to tell me about getting away to the sun in Lanzarote, for 10 days, that being the optimum length of holiday, in his view.

It led me to thinking about the importance of holidays. Or should I say holy days ?

The words are connected historically, meaning a day set aside for religious festival and recreation: the word we have today is a derivation of the older phrase in old English for Holy Day.

Now we know the religious significance of the Sabbath, our Sunday, each week a day being set aside as a "holy day". God out of his consideration for his creation set aside a day for worship, rest and recreation. Jesus took the strict religious observance out of it by saying that the Sabbath is made for man – not man for the Sabbath.

Paul described it by saying that some people set aside one day as special for rest, and worship, while others see each day as the same, and equally important or 'holy'.

Back to our interpretation of days when we seek change, recreation, rest or celebration – holidays.

Now I am aware holidays which involve going away – not necessarily to Lanzarote - are not possible for everyone, because of the lack of finance, care duties, or health problems.

It is only right we remember those people, and avoid boasting about our own selfindulgence too much.

It is also right that we appreciate and thank God for the opportunities for a change of scenery, for making new memories, for new experiences, and for the holistic" (another word connected to the word holy) benefits of a holiday, i.e. the restoration of our wellbeing through the renewing of our mind, body and spirit. We thank God for such times of refreshing. When we can no longer go, we have the memories of earlier times, when with family members or friends we, perhaps, travelled widely, or have a favourite place within the UK which means much to us.
